The President of the Friends writes...

Recently Lois and I went to Cambridge for a long-standing preaching engagement I had at Magdalene College. It was a very

enriching experience; we hardly knew Cambridge and so it was great fun wandering around the place. Magdalene's Chapel is nowhere near as grand as King's or St John's (where Andrew Nethsingha, a former director of music here, heads up the music foundation), but its modest scale and presence gave Evensong an intimate atmosphere. Following the service there was a candlelit dinner in the Hall, which again was a wonderful and somewhat rapt occasion.

It made me think, though, that we can be beguiled by the world we live in. Cambridge colleges evoke a sense of timelessness (the same Latin grace was used before dinner as has been said for centuries), and this can have a hypnotic effect on us. I am not saying for one moment that the Fellows of Magdalene are stuck in a time warp, of course not, but the sense of place provides a reassuring context in which sometimes radical learning can take place.

Cathedrals are no different. We have a fantastic musical and worshipping tradition here at Truro, and that can be very mesmerising. But such familiarity needs to provide a springboard to many other things, otherwise it just becomes a self-indulgence. Of course neither our music nor our worship is self-indulgent because they both take risks from time to time, experiencing new forms and new expressions, and that has to be good.

But that is true of the Cathedral as a whole. We can either rest on our laurels or we can try new things as part of our mission to serve the whole community in the name of Jesus Christ. That can be exhausting, and I am not suggesting either we rip up everything we have done so far, nor make sure that every day is totally different to the one before. An adventurous spirit needs firm foundations and vice versa.

The Friends, I know, are part of this enterprise, and enterprising is a good word to describe the Friends. It is a very good thing to build up our common life by organising events that are fun as well as informative, and the diversity of things the Friends lay on is exceptional.



At the heart of the Friends' activity are two principle elements: firstly, a sense that people matter. We do this for others as well as ourselves, and the encouragement the Friends gives to newcomers at the Cathedral is much appreciated. The second is the awareness that there is something bigger around us to which we devote ourselves. 'Cathedral' is really a catch-all phrase for all sorts of good activity, and the Friends play a vital part in delivering that activity.

So, thank you again to all who are associated with the Friends in any way. Chapter is very appreciative of all your work. If we are minded, sometimes, to think of cathedrals in terms of a beautiful picture in a gilded frame, then I would urge you to challenge that thought. Cathedrals are vibrant, exciting and exploratory places in which Christian principles are lived out to the full. The Friends play their part in that here in Truro, and they deserve a big thank you for so doing.

Truro Cathedral Sewing Guild

2015 began with the usual round of repairs to embroidery on vestments, hems to be raised or lowered and buttons to be sewn on. A bigger job appeared with the renovation of various vestments for Canon Perran's move to the Isles of Scilly. This took some time as it involved transferring large amounts of braid from one garment to another, hemming etc. but we managed to meet the deadline. Anne Pengelly needed some help with the new stoles for the white set, so we were able to lend a hand with that.

Earlier on we made 6 new cravats for the Choir men and 30 more were requested. These items are labour intensive as, once the basic garment is assembled, it is pleated by hand in six places, tacked and sewn in place. Latterly, we all became so bored with them that it became a case of, "If you don't toe the line, you will have to pleat the cravats" We are all relieved that that particular task is now complete.

We have started work on 3 new stoles for our new Curate, Jane Horton. The stoles will be designed by the Guild in consultation with Jane and we are almost ready to start cutting out and sewing the first one. This is an exciting project as the designs are original and involve the co-operation of the whole team. Also in the pipeline is the renovation of some kneelers in St Mary's Aisle and the modification of the spare fair linen to bring it into use.

So far this year we have had a pretty constant supply of work but for a while there was a kink in the supply chain. In case there is anyone who doesn't know: If you have a vestment that you wear in the Cathedral and it needs a repair, please bring it direct to the Cathedral office with a note attached saying what repairs are needed and ask for it to be taken to the sewing room where we will deal with it asap.

The Sewing Guild seems to be moving along nicely and we now have two new members: Dee Gordon Jackson and Pam Dodd, both of whom are proving to be useful additions to the team. We are extremely crowded in the present sewing room and look forward to moving into larger and more suitable accommodation, hopefully, in the not too distant future; It would be so wonderful not to have to reshuffle everyone in order to put up the ironing board or to let someone in or out of the room.

Music at Truro Cathedral

Since I last wrote to you, the big development in terms of our music has been the introduction of girl Choristers to the Cathedral Choir. Seventeen girls, aged 13 to 17, were installed at the Eucharist on Sunday 11th October in a beautiful service at which the boy Choristers handed the girls their white surplices to welcome them into the tradition of which they are



now joint custodians. I must admit to having been quite moved at this historic moment. Our Cathedral Choir dates back to the earliest days of the Cathedral, including the "wooden shed" period from 1880 to 1887. Since then, it has evolved in response to changing circumstances, for example when the Lay Vicars agreed to come in to join the boys for six services each week, rather than three; or when Choral Scholars were introduced. Having girl Choristers is the latest part of this ongoing development and I have tried my best to make it clear to the girls that, as they enter each service in a dignified procession, bow at the altar, turn to face each other and offer

their voices to God, they are upholding and sustaining our choral tradition just as much as the boys whose singing I know the Cathedral community treasures beyond words. They have received overwhelming support and encouragement from our community and I am proud to be at a church that is prepared to innovate in this way when the time is right.

The girls all attend Truro School and it has been a joy to work with the staff there to put in place the comprehensive systems necessary to support young people giving so much of their time to such a specialist activity. Needless to say, we have drawn on our experience working with Polwhele House School, where the boy Choristers (in the younger age range of 8 to 13) continue to be educated and nurtured so incredibly well.



It has been great to be able to introduce a wealth of new music, with our second set of Choristers, and I hope those of you who worship regularly with us are finding that variety enriching at the services. It is a sign of how talented the girls are that I gave them one of the two Nine Lessons and Carols services to sing (the boys singing the other one) in December. You can hear three carols from the girls' service (23rd December) and the entire boys' service (24th December) as webcasts on our Soundcloud page online. It was lovely to have the whole choir family – 17 girls, 18 boys and 12 adults – together for Christmas Day. We will field this full team again for both services on Easter Day.

The boys and adults of the choir have sung concerts in Falmouth and Padstow in October and February, as well as a live BBC Radio 3 broadcast of Evensong in February. They have given premieres of new pieces by

Paul Drayton and Paul Comeau, and are preparing to record a CD of music by Spanish and Portuguese Renaissance composers in May (Victoria, Guerrero, Vivanco and Lobo).

A very special project came to fruition with the release of our first DVD in December. This DVD records for posterity the whole story of the Nine Lessons and Carols service, and its Truro origins under Benson in 1880 (long before it travelled to Cambridge). There is a documentary presented by one of the UK's leading carol scholars, Jeremy Summerly, as well as a live DVD



recording of our Nine Lessons service from 23rd December 2014. There is also an audio-only CD of a reconstruction of the music from the first ever Nine Lessons service in 1880. This whole package is available from our Cathedral Shop, as well as the usual online outlets. I hope it will cement Truro's ownership of this service which has travelled all over the world.

Do look out for the Truro Cathedral Choir Facebook page (separate from the Cathedral's main page, but linked to it) where you can see regular (almost daily) updates about all that goes on, publicly and behind the scenes, to maintain our choral tradition.

Cathedral Education Department

It has been particularly busy for the Education department recently! This week we have welcomed Truro Prep, St Merryn, Parc Eglos and Troon School. The children have learnt about the different roles of those who work here by dressing up and taking part in a mini precession through the Cathedral. Lots of them have sat in the Cathedra and many have seen if they can spot Truro Cathedral in John Miller's 'Cornubia' painting. Lots of souvenir Bishop, Canon and Chorister finger puppets have gone home with the children too, thanks to the careful cutting out and sewing by our 'Snippers'!

On Wednesday 2nd March, we will have welcomed over 150 children in one day as we prepare for our 'Big Sing' concert. The event will celebrate the formation of the St Piran's Trust bringing together 5 Cornish schools Bishop Bronescombe, Grampound with Creed, Grampound Road, Ladock and Veryan. Alongside his role as Education Assistant and Lay Vicar at Truro Cathedral, Charlie Murray teaches singing with the Cornwall Music Service Trust and has been working as singing teacher for Grampound-with-Creed and Bishop Bronescombe C of E school. During the day alongside their rehearsals, the children will take part in various tours and arts activities. Lizzie Arthur will be running 5 workshops where children will get the chance to see some of the treasures of the cathedral and try on some costumes. Children will also make a collective art installation with Beverly Hulme and we warmly welcome Kirsten Gordon back to help out for the day. The concert will take place that evening and we are delighted to hear that Bishop Tim will be attending!

Also last year we had a Truro ringers dinner held in the Cathedral Restaurant with lots of ringers from around Cornwall as well as visitors from Oxford, Staffordshire and Devon, around forty six guests sitting down to a sumptuous meal, with many thanks to Marilyn and her staff.

Well along with Sunday ringing, various practices and visitors to ring and see our tower I think that we have had quite a busy year.


Truro Cathedral Restaurant
