PRESIDENT'S REPORT AUTUMN 2015

I don't know if you know the series *The West Wing*. It is a fictionalised account of President Jed Bartlett, played by Martin Sheen, and his team as they deal with all sorts of issues facing his administration. In many respects it's how we want things to be; people with vision and commitment trying to put into practice what they believe in.

There is an alternative series doing the rounds at the moment. In fact it is an adaption of the British TV series, which goes by the same name; *House of Cards*. In it Kevin Spacey's American president, Frank Underwood (a take on the character played by Ian Richardson's British prime minister, Francis Urquhart) displays a more cynical, more Machiavellian approach to power, and perhaps, it could be said, this version probably has more realism about it than the idealised *West Wing* approach.

In many respects these two series are both sides of the same coin: there is a significant institution, in this case the American presidency, which people see and interpret in different ways. It's what happens when people think about things. Of course these fictionalised versions of things tend to paint extremes. The truth often hovers in the middle.

Cathedrals are no different to any other institution in this regard. Many people have many opinions about the Cathedral. I do, as Dean, you do as the reader of this article, people who come to events do, people who come in just to light a candle do, and when we get all these perspectives coming together you sometimes get differences of opinion. That's the way of it.

But different views needn't be poles apart from each other. Sometimes the most creative places are those where different people can express different views imaginatively, and where other people are prepared to listen to them. What binds these differences together are the values which the institution, in this case the Cathedral, are trying to live out. In our case it is the fact that we want to see ourselves as Sacred Space and Common Ground, a place where holiness is found and where everyone is welcome.

Of course there are a multiplicity of ways in trying to realise this, and part of the fun – and I mean fun – of being Dean is working with and listening to others who have different ideas than myself about how this can be done. One of the joys of being here, for instance, is the fact that the Friends of Truro Cathedral are always thinking of new ideas to support the Cathedral's work and have lots of fun on the way. Boat trips, quizzes, panel games (Just a Minute, Would I Lie to You), musical soirees, cinema trips are all things that the Friends have organised over the years to great effect and success. It's all about deepening the quality of life at the Cathedral, and for all their hard work, effort and imagination I am very grateful.

But this can only come about because we are all different. We may not always see eye to eye on everything, but that is precisely the point. We should have the gumption and the humility (and I am speaking as much to myself here as I am to anyone else) to allow other people's ideas and perspectives to penetrate our minds, so we can see that we don't always have the answers, and that others can be just as committed and as imaginative as we take ourselves to be.

So, a big thank you to the Friends. We are all fortunate in having this wonderful group of people who support the common life of the Cathedral in the ways you do, broadening our horizons as you do so. Long may your unflagging energies and great ideas continue!

And I'll leave you with a chance of profiling your Dean: whom do I most resemble, Jed Bartlett or Frank Underwood? Answers on a postcard, please, to the Cathedral office. I will only, of course, accept the right answer!

Message from the Chairman

As I sit writing this letter to you the dark clouds and torrential rain of the morning have given way to bright sunshine with the temperature rising to the mid 20s (mid 70s Fahrenheit). Good summer weather is, of course, what visitors to Cornwall hope for to spend time outdoors, savour our beautiful scenery and enjoy balmy days on the beach. In Cornwall we are used to changing weather and this summer so far has not been kind to many of our visitors. This has meant that Truro has been busier than usual. I hope the boost in visitor numbers to the Cathedral will have provided a benefit to the "Tile the Aisle" roof appeal launched earlier this summer.

£3.2m is a lot of money for the Cathedral to raise to re-slate but this is the first time this has been needed after the original roofing was built up to 135 years ago. This undertaking will be done in stages over the next few years and work has started on the nave roof. If you haven't done so already, I encourage you to help Tile the Nave (the first stage) by donating

and signing a slate as part of the Cathedral's appeal (details on the Cathedral's website or at the back of the nave). It has been good to learn that Chapter with guidance from the new Cathedral Architect, Izaak Hudson, and Ellen McKessock have been putting together a 10 year plan to address the fabric of the building, improve its facilities and ensure its place as the mother church of the diocese and a home for uplifting worship and church music can continue for the next 100 years. I hope this planning will become a rolling exercise.

In my last letter to you I mentioned the Cathedral's public toilets which are in need of refurbishment and the willingness of the Friends to finance this project. The Cathedral still has to receive quotations for this work which includes a welcome increase in the capacity of the Ladies' facilities. Nevertheless it is envisaged that the necessary work will be completed this autumn after the summer boost to visitor numbers is over.

I am pleased that a strong set of candidates was elected to Council at last May's Annual Meeting and we now have a secretary, Roberta Evans who is familiar with what this role entails. Mary Prior did a sterling job as both Treasurer and Acting Secretary last year and I offer her your thanks for all that she did for your association during that time. Finally, do come to the our Autumn Meeting and lunch on Sunday 27th September when Dean Roger will unpack his and Chapter's refreshed vision for the Cathedral, its role, activities and challenges that lie ahead. I look forward to seeing you then

Treasurer's Report Autumn 2015

Since our Spring Newsletter the Fund Raising Committee have done marvels producing several profit making events which needless to say were also very enjoyable for those of us able to attend.

In addition to this our gift aid claim for the year 6th April 2014 to 5th April 2015 has produced £1091 and we have received a small but very welcome legacy of £100 and a donation of £50. Legacies and donations however small are always much appreciated.

Looking as always to get maximum value from moneys received from members we have now changed our telephone and internet arrangements with the result that we should save £200 over the next year and £100 per annum thereafter.

At the last Council Meeting in July it was agreed that we should increase our grant to the Flower Guild from £850 to £1100 per annum and at the next Meeting we will be looking at other regular grants that we make with a view to possible increase as for various reasons everything costs so much more nowadays.

At the end of our Film Club season calculations showed that we had made £259.12 "profit" and in accordance with our arrangements with Chapter this amount was paid to them as rent for use of the Pearson Room. We are now looking for subscriptions for the forthcoming season of films and with the improvement in the equipment we are sure this will prove popular again.

EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

Why is Truro Cathedral a Special Place?

Thousands of children join our Learning team to consider this question each year. We are constantly reminded of the awe and wonder this beautiful building inspires in the hearts of our youngest visitors, many of whom are taking their first steps inside. Yet it is most definitely the people, as much as the building itself, who make is as special as it is.

Many happy hours are spent with school groups dressing up as Choristers and Canons (and occasionally Pearson and Bishop Benson make an appearance!), exploring the hard work and faith of people throughout the Cathedral's history up to the present day. And visitors throughout the holidays will be able to benefit from the hard work of another special group of people: our Snippers Club, who spend one morning a week chopping, snipping and sewing in order to keep our 'Messy Table' stocked with interesting things to make and do – all inspired by our unique surroundings.

We are very happy to welcome Lizzie Arthur back to the Learning Team. She will be filling the role of Education Officer while Kirsten Gordon is away on maternity leave. She will be involved in several exciting projects, such as the Bells Open Day on 12th September, three 'Big Sing' workshop and concert days for schools, and a fresh exhibition of work by Falmouth University's BA Contemporary Crafts students early next year. Not forgetting of course our contribution to the MU Fun Day on 20th August, which we are sure will be a great success as in previous years.



This Summer, you will find children's activities taking place four days a week. Activities such as these would not be possible without the support of volunteers, so if you would like to assist us with the supervision of these activities or our formal school workshops, do get in touch with the Cathedral Office to receive more information on the voluntary roles available with the Education department.

Truro Cathedral Company Of Ringers 2015

Our present Company of Ringers number around seventeen with another twelve who are more associate members and only ring occasionally with us.

We ring twice on a Sunday, at 9.30am for the Eucharist, and at 3.30pm for Evensong. Practice night is on a Tuesday at 7.30pm where we are sometimes joined by other ringers from various parts of Cornwall and further afield. We also have a Twelve bell practice once a month, this being open to ringers who wish to try their hand on higher numbers of bells.

The Cathedral also has a number of weddings each year some of whom require the bells to be rung, and this year we have been asked to ring on three occasions.

Also we have six peal attempts per year where ringing teams come from all over the country to ring on these lovely bells. Since the bells have been augmented there have been nine peals on the twelve, and we are completely booked up until the end of 2016 at the present time.

Many people tell me how much they enjoy hearing the bells being rung. On September 12th we are having a tower open day at the Cathedral, when people will be able to come and if able, climb the tower steps to the ringing chamber to see the bells being rung and hear a little bit about them. There will be a chance to have a go, (under supervision) and perhaps if interested learn to ring. Also there will be other ringing activities going on in the Cathedral including a Mini Ring of bells, Handbells, and several stalls with people talking and demonstrating various things about ringing. So do all come along and see us.

Each Sunday morning before we ring a member of the Chapter comes up into the ringing chamber and leads us in prayer. We also have an AGM each year for election of officers and business, and this is normally chaired by the Canon Precentor. The Dean is our President.

This year we held a Truro ringers dinner in the Cathedral Restaurant with forty five people present, a lovely evening was had by all.

Children's Church

'Our prayer is public and for all and when we pray, we pray not for a single person, but for the whole people, because we are all one.'

In Children's Church at Truro Cathedral we follow 'All Sorts Worship' by Claire Benton-Evans, which covers services for every Sunday of the Common Worship Year A, B and C, which means that we (that is those attending Children's Church) follow the same lectionary and liturgy as do our family and friends.

We hope that by doing this we are giving the children an experience of real shared worship and a sense of belonging. A sort of hands-on practicality of messy church by a child-centred spirituality and reflective storytelling of Godly Play.

The children return, at the offertory, with their symbols of the worship that they have experienced. They then return to their family to share together in the Eucharist. Claire, when devising her All-sorts Worship says: 'Through these years of shared debate, experiment and exploration, I found myself returning again and again to my daughter's question: 'What is church for? What's the point of it?"

This question goes to the heart of why we do what we do on a Sunday morning – and on the other six days of the week. Rowan Williams describes the church like this: '...the Church is first of all a kind of space cleared by God through Jesus in which people may become what God made them to be (God's sons and daughters), and that what we have to do about the Church is not first to organise it as a society but to inhabit it as a climate or landscape. It is a place where we can see properly – God, God's creation, ourselves.' Children's Church aims to create that space for our children.
