## The President of the Friends writes...

There will very much be a sense of 'All Change' this summer for the Chapter as we say farewell to three of our number. Canon Perran will be leaving us for the Isles of Scilly, and our two Chapter Canons, Bob and Bridget, will be standing down after having served the Cathedral so wonderfully since chapter canons were introduced nearly fifteen years ago. Between them, Perran, Bob

and Bridget will have given fifty-one years of service to the life of the Cathedral, at the heart of its governance. We owe them all a huge debt of thanks.

Yet nothing lasts forever. I always remember Bishop Bill saying something about his time as bishop of Truro, how he would always say goodnight to his predecessors as he went to bed each night, their portraits being on the wall of the corridor that led from his office to the stairs. It reminded him, he said, of his own position as someone just passing through. That is something I am very conscious of as well. When you are associated with something fairly wonderful like the Cathedral you are, or ought to be, aware that the thing is bigger than yourself, that it had a life before you came and will have a life after you have gone.

There is the temptation, though, to see yourself as somehow having more importance than that, especially if you have a fairly prominent position like being the dean. It is all so very easy to fall into the trap of convincing yourself that, because I am the dean, I will necessarily have an impact on the place because I inhabit such an important position in the life of the Cathedral. Now, I am not arguing the opposite, that because the place is bigger than myself there is no point in doing anything because I am merely passing through; that way leads to inertia. But it does mean that whatever I, or anyone for that matter, do, it all takes place within the bigger story of the context of the place.

Truro Cathedral has been around for well over a 125 years now, and in that time it has seen people come and go, each of them not only telling their own stories but also contributing the overall story of the Cathedral itself. Of course, our own memories are limited; I have no way of knowing who the movers and shakers were in the 1960s for instance, any more than people floating around here in 2065 will know who Roger Bush and Mark Evans were.

And yet there is something really rather moving about being part of something which attracts people from all backgrounds to help tell its story. It's a story of faith, of worship, of community, of music, of friendships, of support in times of sorrow and celebration in times of joy, and that has to mean something in our society where we are so concentrated on the individualistic and the here and now. Traditions do matter, not in a sense of always doing something the way that they have always been done, but in recognising that in our society there are values and beliefs that are important, that transcend the selfish and the secular, that mean something, and which we want to be part of.

That is what the Friends are about, really. We are drawn to the Cathedral because it says something about what is important to us, and when we are here we want to contribute something positive to its common life and purpose. That may mean looking out for someone who is not very well or is new and appears a bit lonely, it may mean doing things to raise money for the work of the place, or it may mean doing things just to have fun: why not? This is what the Friends are about, reminding us, if we needed reminding, that people matter and that we care for them. And that, not unsurprisingly, goes back to the Gospel.

It will be a wrench to say goodbye to Perran, Bob and Bridget, and we know that we will miss them terribly. But they will be the first to say that others will come along to take their places who will be very different to them, who will be sincere in their contribution to the place and who will inspire our affection and respect just as much as these three stalwarts have done. That is not to do with the fact that we recognise our own mortality, and that things, and people, move on, but rather it is do with the more important thing that this place, this Cathedral community says something about the friendship we find in God, and how the sharing of that friendship is a constant feature of all our lives: it was there before us, and will be there after we have gone.

What we are celebrating, therefore, is not just the quality of the people concerned, but what they stand for, what they hint at, which is nothing less than the love of God made known and real in the lives of people. Anything and anyone that contributes to that deserves our thanks and praise, whether they be individuals moving onto new things from here, or the Friends who add real depth and quality to our common life.

My thanks and blessings to you all.

# Message from the Chairman



Dear fellow friends,

Dean Roger has written eloquently about the contributions Canons Perran, Bob and Bridget have made over many years to Chapter and the cathedral. Perran and Bob, of course, have been members of the Friends' Council for many years where they provided guidance and gave freely of their time, wisdom and experience as did Canon Philip Lambert who left Truro for Crete last summer. We are indebted to them all for all they have given and wish them well in the future. Apart from Perran, our thanks are due to three other members who will be standing down from Council this year, they are Philip & Ann Stevens and Anne Pengelly. Each of them, in their own way, have given valuable service to the Friends and whose wisdom helped me ease into my role as your chairman over the last year.

These changes mean that there will be some vacancies on Council to fill at this year's AGM. Council provides oversight and direction to the activities and fund raising with most of the work being done by the Social & Fundraising Committee which is ably led by Joy Reynolds. On your behalf I thank all members of this committee for giving both time and effort freely and organising many successful activities. Thanks are also due to Chris Rowe, our membership secretary, and especially to Mary Prior, she has combined her role as treasurer with being acting secretary to Council for the last year and, from my perspective, "kept the show on the road". The role of secretary has two different functions: one is arranging Council meetings and minutes whilst the other is more administrative and covers, inter alia, correspondence and collating reports for the production of newsletters (superbly typeset by Keith Sparrow). If you have either or both or even none of these skill sets, please consider offering yourself to become a member of Council at this year's AGM when we have seven vacancies to fill. Council will function more efficiently if we have a full complement of members and officers.

I am pleased that some members of the cathedral community are willing to stand and that our Canon Chancellor, Alan Bashforth, has been proposed as a representative of Chapter. This still leaves four vacancies to be filled. Council have approved, in principle, two projects to fund in the cathedral. These are the refurbishment of the toilets near the Chapter House entrance and restaurant and improving disabled access to the cathedral. Replacing the toilet facilities is necessary as in their current state they detract from the wonderful experience for visitors to the cathedral and its restaurant. The self closing door at the top of the disabled ramp by the cathedral shop has been problematic and not useable since late last year. Its replacement by a sensor operated sliding door which will be neither caught by the wind nor heavy to open is being investigated. At the time of writing our offer to consider funding these two projects has been welcomed by the Cathedral's "Exec Committee" and quotes are about to be sought. I will update you on these projects and the Friends' website at the AGM.

Many of you will be aware that the quinquennial survey of the cathedral revealed some necessary and substantial works which have to be done to maintain the building properly and protect it from the elements. Not least of these is re-tiling the roof which will require a major fund raising initiative. I understand that Chapter will be launching an appeal later this year and our association will do whatever we can to assist Chapter in this scheme.

If you can, please come to the AGM on Sunday 17th May. I am sure the presentation which follows from Canon Lynda on her time as head of church research at Archbishops' Councils before coming to Truro will be fascinating and challenging. I look forward to seeing you then.

Thank you for your support over the last year, it is valued and important.



### Pastoral Care at Truro Cathedral

Pastoral Care takes many forms in congregational life and is the glue that holds our cathedral community together so that we can be more effective Friends of the cathedral. It is ably coordinated through the Pastoral Care Network and Chapter is very grateful for this vital contribution to cathedral life. Members of the network are trained and endorsed by Truro diocese.

They meet together with the Canon Pastor on a monthly basis to facilitate coordination and encourage mutual support. Pastoral ministry through the team is thus also coordinated with the priestly ministry of the residentiary canons and the priest vicars. This lay and ordained ministry includes the provision of home communions, bereavement support, home visits, transport to services, hospital visiting and baptism visiting.

The cathedral has good working relationships with the hospital chaplaincies across Cornwall. It is formally linked on a pastoral basis to the churches on the Isles of Scilly and congregation members have been active in offering their services to a Scillonian Support network for those Scillonians (and their families) who need pastoral support while, for example, receiving medical care in hospital.

The main Sunday morning congregation continues to enjoy opportunities for fellowship over Sunday carvery lunches on a regular monthly basis and towards thirty congregation members now participate. There are local residents who are unable to attend cathedral services and pastoral

outreach to nearby sheltered/ warden assisted residential homes has been further developed. It now includes a joint carol service kindly hosted by Sunley Orford House.

Many visitors come to the cathedral seeking prayer and solace, and the cathedral vergers play a key role in the coordination of the steady stream of prayer requests made through the cathedral prayer box and web portal. I am grateful for their assistance too with the coordination of the daily intercessions in our cathedral services and the inclusion of intercessions for the long term sick at the weekly Thursday Evening Prayer.

The candle pricket stands attract generous levels of donations and contributions are made to Cornwall based charities including the local farming community, the homeless, the distressed and the terminally ill.

Many visitors both from Cornwall and beyond take advantage of individual cathedral services supported by the Pastoral Care Network and others to address particular pastoral needs, for example, the annual Remember Our Child and the now biennial Addaction services.

Alongside the different congregations in the cathedral, there are many groups of volunteers on which cathedral life is very dependent. Whilst the Pastoral Care Network is there to support pastoral care extended to volunteers it is dependent on the eyes and ears of everyone looking out for the wellbeing of others particularly in their volunteer groups. The best pastoral care comes from those we know and with whom we are familiar.

Over the last few years pastoral care at the cathedral has become more effective but on occasions people have been unintentionally missed. We personally benefit as we exercise mutual pastoral care and the Pastoral Care Network is there to support the various volunteer groups to exercise this care among themselves too.

## Music at Truro Cathedral In my September report, I reviewed our Cathedral Choir trip to the Isles of Scilly in April, the CD recording sessions in May, and our reconstruction in June of Lutheran Vespers, as it might have taken place during Bach's time in Leipzig (complete with orchestra). I also introduced our new personnel, boy Choristers, Lay Vicars and Scholars, who joined us in September. For this current report, I will pick up where I left off and begin by focusing on two important events in October. The first is that we held a "Be a Chorister for a Day" event for girls. As you will be well aware by now, plans are in full swing to introduce a set of girl Choristers to run in parallel with our wonderful boy Choristers. The girls will be in the age range 13 to 18 and will all attend Truro School, whose staff it has been a joy to work with so closely in recent months. The boys, in their younger age range of 8 to 13, will remain at Polwhele House School which has been such an important ingredient in fostering their excellence for more than 30 years now. Both sets of Choristers will mostly sing with the Lay Vicars and Choral Scholars, but very rarely at the same time; my hope is that each will have its own distinctive identity, musically and socially. Whichever set of Choristers is singing, the group will be Truro Cathedral Choir. The open day was a great success and culminated in some 20 girls joining the current boys and gentlemen to sing Evensong, a service you can hear as a live webcast on Soundcloud. We held auditions in November and January and I am delighted that we have 18 extremely talented girls ready to join us in September. We hope to have our first services with the girl Choristers on Sunday 11th October.

The second significant event in October was the "Cornwall Remembers" week running up to Remembrance Day. In a packed schedule of lectures (including one by Michael Portillo), musical events (including a fabulous lvor Gurney evening), poetry readings, schools' workshops and art exhibitions, the Cathedral Choir sang daily themed Evensongs and also took part in two moving performances of Benjamin Britten's War Requiem on the Saturday and Sunday evenings. They somehow managed to offer what I felt was a particularly special performance of the Fauré Requiem on the Sunday morning as well! To conclude what was effectively a festival of remembrance, the Choristers sang at a service on Remembrance Day itself, when some 10,000 poppies were dropped from the central tower.

As well as our normal round of services and concerts in December, we sang a concert for the Tresanton Hotel in St Mawes to raise money for our choir tour fund. At our Advent Carol Service, we gave the first performance of "Seven Magnificat Antiphons" by Gabriel Jackson, and at Nine Lessons and Carols we gave the first performance of "The Salutation Carol" by Russell Pascoe.

Another major project, for which we did most of the hard work in December and January, was the making of a DVD. This is a pioneering project that will culminate in a release which will include a DVD of Nine Lessons and Carols from 23rd December 2014, followed by a substantial documentary about the history of the Nine Lessons service from Bishop Benson to the present day. There will be a separate CD alongside the DVD which will include an audio-only recording of a reconstruction of the first ever Nine Lessons service, which took place in Truro in 1880.

In the new year, the Choristers presented their annual Cushion Concert which, for the first time, was combined with a "Be a Chorister for a Day" event for boys aged 7 to 9. We have since had our auditions and have appointed four talented boy Choristers who will start with us in September.

Our CD of music by First World War composers, which includes all six of Parry's magnificent "Songs of Farewell", was released in November and we have been fortunate to have had flattering reviews in the classical press, including Gramophone and International Record Review. I was particularly pleased that BBC Music Magazine published a podcast review of the CD, something normally reserved for the most distinguished national and international artists.

Looking ahead, we have a "come and sing" event on Sunday 26th April. Do please consider joining us for this rare chance to sing with the Cathedral Choir, and see separate publicity for full details. Our summer concert on Saturday 20th June at 5.00pm has the most incredible programme which will include John Tavener's "Funeral Ikos", Arvo Pärt's "The Beatitudes" and the Durufle Requiem – all music the Choir will relish getting its teeth into.



We will record a CD of music by Gabriel Jackson in May and we have a live broadcast of Choral Evensong on BBC Radio 3 on Wednesday 3rd June at 3.30pm. Music, for the Eve of Corpus Christi, will include Finzi's great anthem "Lo, the full, final sacrifice" and the Evening Canticles in A by Sumsion.
